Questions:

Q: *What are your qualifications for this office?*

A: While completing my double masters degrees in Management and Operations, I was selected to help start-up an airline that later became part of the 3rd largest airline in the world. I co-founded a successful ad agency with prestigious firms and large corporations as clients. I've owned and operated an award-winning, top-producing franchise, while maintaining my career as an Airline Pilot and raising my two children, along with volunteering in my community. These experiences have taught me to be an effective and efficient decision maker; to work well under pressure; to manage staff; to be familiar with high-dollar budgets; and to be a strong leader. Piloting a jetliner across the world, responsible for hundreds of lives, calls for a calm cool head, clear direct communication, teamwork, confidence, leadership and the ability to understand vast amounts of technical information. However, I believe my long history of community service is extremely valuable.

Q: *What strategies will you use to ensure open communication between City Hall and residents?*

A: To continue utilizing existing mediums, such as our Town website, social media platforms, emergency alert system, etc. along with remaining approachable and accessible to Town Staff and residents.

Q: *What are your top environmental and land development concerns and how do you plan to address them?*

A: Our long-term infrastructure plan needs to be proactively examined to ensure water, drainage, roads and park facilities are maintained and updated. I would work with the MUD, with direction from an industry expert, in order to determine short and long term plans, options and impacts of dissolution, absorption or other solutions. Trophy Club is almost built-out, so I believe a focus should be on long-term financial responsibility, utilizing our current tax base to maintain desired services.

Questions:

Q: *What are your qualifications for this office?*

A: I was elected twice for Trophy Club Council Place 2. I spent my last year on council as the Mayor Pro Tem. While serving on the Finance Committee, I suggested the idea of starting the first Homestead Exemption for Trophy Club and council agreed. It was implemented in 2019. Before being on council, I served on the Economic Development Corporation. I've lived in Trophy Club since 2013. My wife Rene' and I have been married for 25 years and both our kids graduated from Byron Nelson High School. I am the President and minority owner of Control Products Corporation based in Grand Prairie, TX. With a staff of 110, we engineer and manufacture lighting products for the US Military. Our core products support the F15, F16, F18, Blackhawk, high level simulators and missile programs.

Q: *What strategies will you use to ensure open communication between City Hall and residents?*

A: I've always published my personal cell number and email. I believe being available to talk to residents is very important. People know they can come to me, I may not agree, but they know I will listen. I am honest and without an agenda. I want what's best for the residents and I want to hear what issues they may have. It's the same approach I have at work. Chain of command is important, but my employees know my door is always open. I have a saying, "Don't ever be afraid to ask".

Q: *What are your top environmental and land development concerns and how do you plan to address them?*

A: With development, we must insure private property isn't affected negatively. Residents of Trophy Club love the small-town feel, and we also enjoy the selection of local businesses. Some of the growth has created rain runoff. There are standards in place to protect the homeowner, but we must do better. Clearing debris and making sure developers live up to the agreement is pertinent. We have 2 parcels of land, owned by the town, left to develop. 5 acres next to HG SPLY and 2 just south of Town Hall. I do not support giving that land away as incentive for the next development. That land now has value and someone with pay for it. We must be patient because we only have one shot to get it right. Everyone has an idea of what's the best use for the land. Personally, I want something that brings in sales tax revenue. We are so dependent on property taxes. By adding sales tax revenue, we can increase the homestead exemption or decrease the tax rate or both.

Q: *What is your vision for transportation infrastructure in your community and how will you advance it?*

A: Our roads are top notch and the residents expect it to remain that way. We do have room for improvement. We have a number of streets without sidewalks and this needs to be addressed. It's a safety hazard for everyone but mostly kids. I want to have a cost study and plan to add sidewalks where it makes sense. Not every road needs them. I would expect residents in cul-d-sacs like it just as it is. But, let's get a plan in place and a timeline to start adding them where needed.

Q: *What is your vision for the future of your municipality and how would you achieve it?*

A: Everything is a golf cart away. Need groceries, golf cart. Take the kids to school, golf cart. Dinner, golf cart. Play golf....we have 36 holes. Seriously though. I moved here in 2013 because of the schools and the easy highway access. Everything you need is in Trophy Club or a short drive away. The vision I want people to have is simple, Trophy Club is family. We are a unique, friendly, loving town. That's achieved by the overwhelming support the town gives to the schools, teachers, police, fire and neighbors. I want more events that bring people together. I envision a yearly fishing event for the kids. I would love to have concerts in the park. A farmer's market. An arts and crafts fair. Events in the town bring people together and smiles on everyone's face.

Q: *COVID-19: What actions can the city take to address the health and economic impact caused by COVID-19?*

A: I'm not a health expert. In my business, I've had policies in place early on to best protect my employees. We take temperatures, require hand washing and wear masks when not seated at your workstation. I believe it's important to educate proper hygiene but to shut down businesses is an overstep of government. Let business owners decide what is best for their employees. Let customers decide what is best for themselves. Our economy cannot survive, and small businesses suffer with mandated shut downs. People that have invested their life savings into a business have lost it all and it's not right. Educate, don't mandate.

Q: *Open Government: How will you ensure government transparency (open records, open meetings) is maintained during a state of emergency?*

A: Local policies and state laws are in place to maintain open records and open meetings. We have broadcast meetings via Facebook for some time now. We are all learning what a Zoom meeting is. I've used them at work, with family and with friends. Trophy Club has used them for meetings.

A: Trophy Club is fortunate. There will not be a budget deficit because of COVID. Online sales tax income has actually increased from last year.

Questions:

Q: *What are your qualifications for this office?*

A: We moved to Trophy Club 19 years ago and have been involved in serving the community and my neighborhood for the past 18 years. I have served 7 years on Council and was term limited in May of 2019. During those years, three (3) as Mayor Pro Tem, the Council accomplished significant financial savings, updating Town Ordinances, Rules of Procedure, modernizing Town facilities and improving our Town Staff. I served on The Lakes of Trophy Club HOA as it's President for 12 years 2002-14.

Q: *What strategies will you use to ensure open communication between City Hall and residents?*

A: I have been involved in direct communications with Residents my entire time serving our community, I believe that as Council Members we are the conduit for the Residents to Town staff who are in charge of the day to day operations, communications and maintenance of the Town. I believe that if a Resident asks for an answer, opinion or help they are entitled to a response and help with that issue, "Thank you for your input" is not sufficient.

Q: *What are your top environmental and land development concerns and how do you plan to address them?*

A: As to Land Development there are a few lots (residential and commercial) left and they are for the most part zoned and ready to be built which will lead to a complete buildout in the very near future. The immediate environmental issues will be for several areas in Town that have significant water flow/flooding issues. They need to be addressed in the near future, it may require the issuance of new Bonds, I believe that with maturing bonds being paid off this new bond initiative will not cause an increase in the bond tax rate. The Town also has a Sewer and Drainage fund set up which is charged thru our MUD (Municipal Utility District) for short term repairs. As to the long term, the Town has in place a Design Standards including a drainage plan that is reviewed and updated periodically.

Q: *What is your vision for transportation infrastructure in your community and how will you advance it?*

A: The word "transportation" in Trophy Club is limited to vehicles. Which simply means "The Streets of Trophy Club". We have a portion of our sales tax (Street Maintenance) that is dedicated to our streets for the normal maintenance such as curb repair, panel replacements etc. Long term i.e. major road repairs: Trophy Club Drive, Indian Creek Drive, Phoenix Drive etc are generally set up thru the issuance of a Town bond. The Town has in place a long term Capital Projects plan which coordinates the planning, dates for repair and the funds issued to stay within the tax bond rate

Q: *What is your vision for the future of your municipality and how would you achieve it?*

A: Our Town has a slogan that defines our Town : A Great Place to Call Home” My vision is simple, to work and keep that saying alive for everyone in Trophy Club to believe in that mantra. I believe our residents believe in Safety, Parks, Trails and easy access moving in and out of town. We need to visit our Police and Fire Departments budgets, we have had significant growth since 2015 with residential including an apartment complex and commercial properties including several restaurants without any permanent additions to those departments. Our Parkland is for the most part complete, we put in place a Capital Improvement Plan several years ago and that will keep our playgrounds and fields current and modernized.

Q: *COVID-19: What actions can the city take to address the health and economic impact caused by COVID-19?*

A: As a small town that is within 2 Counties (Denton and Tarrant) we follow their guidelines. The Town has put in place several safety measures for both the staff and visiting residents and guests such as temperature testing, social distancing and mask requirements.

Q: *Open Government: How will you ensure government transparency (open records, open meetings) is maintained during a state of emergency?*

A: With today’s technology the Council meetings are fully transparent with FaceBook Live, it can be viewed in progress or at a later date for viewing. The Open Records Department needs a complete overhaul, I am hopefully that the new IT Company that has been hired will recommend the necessary adjustments to make compliance more efficient and accurate for both staff and the requestor. As to any emergencies the Town has in place a plan and a room in the Town Hall building capable of handling an emergency. In addition, along with our regional Partners there is in place a coordinated plan for any area wide emergencies.

Q: *Budget: How will you address any budget deficit caused by COVID-19?*

A: One of the fortunate benefits for us this year since we have limited sales tax revenue as we are primarily a residential area, the new State Law that now gives the sales tax generated from purchases by TC Residents by out of area businesses such as Amazon now goes to the local Municipality. With the decline in sales tax from local businesses due to Covid-19, this boost saw a break even and possibly a slight increase in sales tax revenue when the final numbers are in for the year. There was a restructure and refinance of several items in the budget this year to take advantage of the lowering of the interest rates. The Town has just outsourced our IT Department and according to the Town Manager that should save us approximately \$50,000 per year. If the health situation continues into next year we will have to look at other ways to balance the budget to try and avoid raising the Tax Rate.

Questions:

Q: *What are your qualifications for this office?*

A: I've lived in Trophy Club for over 15 years and served on our Town Council from 2014-2019. I also served as Vice-Chair of our 2019 Charter Review Commission, and I have been Vice-Chair of our Planning & Zoning Commission since 2019. While on Council, I was named to 9 different subcommittees by the Council, served as Council liaison to our Economic Development Corporation for 4 1/2 years, and served as Mayor Pro Tem for one year. I've worked in technology since graduating from Texas A&M in 2002, and have spent those 18+ years making day-to-day operational decisions for businesses I've been involved with. For almost 15 years, I've led organizations that deliver software services to clients 24x7x365. I'm accustomed to making decisions every day that impact both the present and the future, assessing risk, and balancing costs against value of services provided.

Q: *What strategies will you use to ensure open communication between City Hall and residents?*

A: When working directly with residents, a municipality has to view itself as a customer service-oriented operation. While on Council, I've always been supportive of staff initiatives to improve or expand communication with the community, and insisted that PIO office programs are evaluated and adjusted over time to ensure that we're reaching who we want to reach, and that the audience understands the message. As a Council member, I've provided support and feedback on past efforts to expand the reach of Town messaging via phone, email, web, and social media, as well as the deployment of solutions that make it easier for residents to report issues and submit inquiries to the Town. We have to continue making it easier for residents to find information and provide feedback, as a staff goal for all departments. On a personal level, I've established a reputation for being responsive and transparent in communications with residents as a Council member.

Q: *What are your top environmental and land development concerns and how do you plan to address them?*

A: From a development perspective, Trophy Club is almost completely built out. As an overwhelmingly residential town, our top development priority remains maximizing the sales tax-generating potential of what little commercially zoned property remains undeveloped. Residentially, only a few vacant infill areas remain. I stand with the overwhelming majority of Trophy Club residents that prefer the low-density, single-family zoning that already applies to the few remaining undeveloped residential properties. Environmentally, Trophy Club's adjacency to Lake Grapevine necessitates areas of emphasis for Town staff and engineers. Activities both private and public are routinely affected by environmental policies applicable to watershed areas and federal flowage easements. Our operations have to be aligned with the entities that control these policies. Staff education and awareness is an ongoing priority, and also helps us better formulate plans for maintaining local stormwater infrastructure.

Q: *What is your vision for transportation infrastructure in your community and how will you advance it?*

A: In Trophy Club, transportation infrastructure means streets, streets, and streets. For roughly the last decade, Trophy Club has maintained a robust Capital Improvements Program to ensure that we stay ahead of the curve in taking care of aging streets. While I was on Council, we took full advantage of our ability to finance capital improvement projects without raising the I&S (interest & sinking) portion of our tax rate, keeping streets projects fully funded and programmed years into the future. We also directed staff to complete the first of periodic comprehensive reviews of street conditions to ensure that we had the information necessary to prioritize future streets projects. In the future, I'll continue to support this strategy and look for ways to optimize our process.

Q: *What is your vision for the future of your municipality and how would you achieve it?*

A: Within six months of graduating from Texas A&M and moving to Roanoke, I knew I wanted to live in Trophy Club. Two years later, I bought my first home here. As a Council member, I've tried to be a steward of the characteristics that made me want to live here over 15 years ago. We are routinely named as one of the safest communities in Texas. We have the tax base to remain financially sound. We've got the resources to provide a high level of service to residents, but we're still small enough to have a genuine sense of community. We can maintain and take opportunities to improve by being good stewards of all the advantages we currently enjoy. Location in a high-growth region, residential property values, first responders, community volunteers, proximity to Lake Grapevine, parks, recreational programs, and a commitment to fiscal responsibility all work in concert to maintain the high standards of safety, prosperity and a sense of community among residents.

Q: *COVID-19: What actions can the city take to address the health and economic impact caused by COVID-19?*

A: Trophy Club is a small municipality that doesn't employ its own public health staff. This means almost all COVID-19 health policies will be set by County or State officials. As a result, our role in addressing health impacts caused by COVID-19 should continue to center around two-way communication with residents, transparency, affording each other patience and grace during challenging times, and leaders modeling positive behavior in response to public health mandates. In terms of economic impact, this is the rare time where being an overwhelmingly residential community is an economic advantage. Tax revenues come primarily from residential properties - a revenue stream that has not been significantly impacted. Our FY21 budget takes some measures to mitigate the impact of COVID-19. As we look to the future, we will need to prepare budgetary contingencies in the event of an extended economic downturn that goes on long enough to impact our property tax revenues.

Q: *Open Government: How will you ensure government transparency (open records, open meetings) is maintained during a state of emergency?*

A: Transparency has been an ongoing focus for me as a Council member, and I was a part of several improvements when I served previously. Under the state of emergency, we can do more to ensure that we are as open as possible. Clear, emphatic messaging regarding time and location of public meetings, and COVID-19 policy changes are already taking place and should continue. We also should look closely at any services or interactions with the public that don't have an online/remote option, and deploy one wherever possible. I am 100% committed to the benefits of governing via a deliberative body, and will advocate for limiting use of powers available to the Mayor under the declaration of emergency to the absolute minimum. Maintaining the declaration of emergency is important for a number of statutory reasons, availability of relief funds chief among them, but we should allow for the Mayor & Council to debate and take action normally on policy decisions at every possible opportunity.

Q: *Budget: How will you address any budget deficit caused by COVID-19?*

A: In terms of economic impact, this is the rare time where being an overwhelmingly residential community is an economic advantage. Tax revenues come primarily from residential properties, so we've avoided substantial revenue impact as a Town. Sales tax revenues will obviously fall short of projections, but recent changes in law requiring out-of-state businesses like Amazon to pay city & state sales tax has softened the impact of COVID-19. A tradition of judicious budgeting (I was on Council for 5 of the last 7 budgets) means we can absorb a revenue slump with minimal disruption. The FY21 budget, nearing approval, is built upon conservative revenue forecasts, does not add staff headcount, and limits salary increases to very conservative merit-based raises and/or market adjustments. I support that approach. As we look to the future, we will need to prepare budgetary contingencies in the event of an extended economic downturn that goes on long enough to impact our property tax revenues.

Texas' even year November ballot is determined by a nomination process either by election or convention. In 2020 the Democratic and Republican parties were required to nominate by election. The election day was March 3, 2020. The Green and Libertarian parties may nominate by convention. The convention day was March 10, 2020. Voters may participate in only one party's nomination process.
